Many Improvements Welcome Belle Maer Boaters Back to Home Port This Spring

Boaters returning to Belle Maer this spring will find numerous improvements in the marina. Here are some highlights:

Swimming Pool Improvements – The size of the concrete deck will be increased by more than 80 percent, so you will walk right from the bathhouse door into the swimming pool area. It will extend all the way up to the enclosed area where the propane tank is.

New furniture is being added, including new tables and umbrellas, new chairs and chaise lounges. New landscaping will be added and new fencing installed, so Belle Maer will look like it has a brand new pool!

Other improvements include:

Dredging the channel into the lake to remedy the problem area near the entrance to the BMH channel (near the orange floats) due to excessive shoaling

Resurfacing the tennis basketball courts including repairing the cracks, repaving/resealing and installing a new skin with the tennis court and basketball court striping and coloring.

Commercial painting of the buildings on the marina property to be consistent with the new color scheme.

Replacing coin operated washers and dryers in the bath house building.

Shoring up the underpinning on the bridge to protect its structural integrity.

Replacing entire 150 foot section of the sea wall at the rack building launch area.

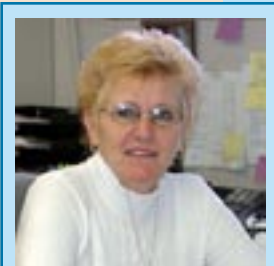
New Faces in New Places At Belle Maer Office

Lake St. Clair Water Levels Up 12 Inches

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports that as of January 19 the water levels in Lake St. Clair are up 12 inches from that of January 19 of 2006.

Normally at this time of the year, the water levels in all of the Great Lakes are in varying degrees of decline, but over the last few months, only Lake Superior has been consistently dropping. During the next month, the water levels on Lake Superior, Michigan-Huron, Erie, and St. Clair are expected to drop 1 to 2 inches each. Lake Ontario, however, is projected to rise 2 inches during the same period. Over the next few months, Lake Superior is predicted to remain well below last year's levels, while Lakes Michigan-Huron, St. Clair, Erie and Ontario are forecasted to remain at or above the water levels of a year ago.

The Detroit Boat Show is regarded as a "buyer's show" with more than 1,500 boats, worth an estimated \$50 million, expected to be sold during the Boat Show's nine-day run.

"The Detroit Boat Show is a great event to attend whether you are in the market to buy a boat, or if you are just looking for an opportunity to have some fun," said Boat Show Manager Van Snider. "We bring more than 1,000 boats to Cobo for easy comparison shopping but we also fill the hall with great family and friend activities and promotions for those looking for some entertainment or something to do with their kids."

Browsers and buyers can shop more than 200 exhibits displaying ski boats, fishing boats, cabin cruisers, bow riders, pontoons and personal watercraft. "Placing an order in February allows you to choose your colors and specs and gets you great deals with first quarter pricing on 2007 product," said Snider. "Excess inventory for 2006 will be sure to bring some special pricing for new 2006 model boats on display as well."

The Detroit Boat Show has been in existence for 49 years and is seen by many as the "premier" boating event in the State of Michigan. "The Detroit Boat Show is known as one of the top boat shows in the country in regards to size, sales and attendance," continued Snider. The Detroit Boat Show is owned and produced by the Michigan Boating Industries Association (MBIA), a non-profit association representing marine businesses throughout the state. 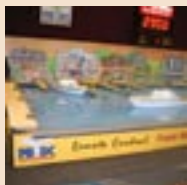

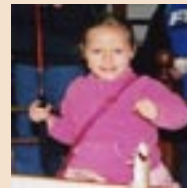
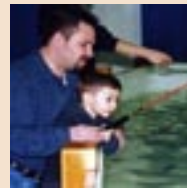
and backs the boat into a fully instrumented slip while the crowd watches and measures the captain's skills against their own skill. Any contact with the slip activates a penalty counter. The contestant then leaves the slip under full throttle and back through the channel markers to stop the Timing Clock while the crowd cheers with approval. The computerized scoring system combines the time and penalty points, displaying the standings for all contestants. Prizes are awarded to winning contestants with the best scores.

Boating Ranks Among Top Stress-Relieving Activities

Americans seeking to escape the daily grind are finding the escape route closer to home and more affordable than originally thought. Boating ranks among the top three stress-relieving activities, according to a 2005 survey conducted by the National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA).

"We know that 90 percent of Americans live less than an hour from a navigable body of water, making the boating lifestyle accessible to most people across the country," says Amy Murray, director of Discover Boating programs for the NMMA. "More people are finding being out on the water aboard a boat is ideal for stress-relief and relaxation while building long-lasting memories with loved ones."

In fact, the NMMA survey of more than 1,000 American households found that the most popular boating-related activity is relaxing with family and friends (40 percent), followed by fishing (33 percent), cruising (14 percent) and waterskiing (8 percent)

Half of respondents that have been boating enjoy the time boating lets them spend in nature and the outdoors, while 25 percent said it offers an escape from daily life. In addition to boating, the survey found other top stress relievers include weekend road trips and exercise.

"When you step onto a boat, you leave the world of deadlines and obligations behind and enter a world of personal time for relaxation," notes Murray. "There are ways to escape daily stressors on land, but there's something about the boating lifestyle that more people are discovering as the ultimate escape."

The NMMA reports that nearly 70 million Americans participated in boating in 2004, an estimated increase of 300,000 from 2003. The number of boats, ranging from canoes and kayaks to cruisers and large yachts, on U.S. waterways grew to nearly 18 million in 2004.

Today, boats are designed for every taste, lifestyle and budget. Many consumers are surprised to learn that they can own a new boat for monthly payments of less than \$200. In 2004, the average price of a new outboard boat, motor and trailer package was approximately \$24,079, while one of the most popular entry-level boat, motor and trailer packages fell into the \$10,000 range.

Boat vs. Yacht Insurance: Fritsch-Kinney Demystifies What You Need to Know Before You Launch This Spring

Unlike a typical homeowner's or vehicle insurance policy, the language in boat and yacht policies can vary tremendously from company to company, and even from policy to policy. Make sure you know what you're buying before you launch this spring, according to Eric Kinney at Fritsch-Kinney Yacht Insurance, a division of ALCOS.

For example, Kinney said, insuring a boat is completely different from insuring a yacht. He explained that yachts are classified as vessels 27 feet or more in length, while boats are 26 feet or less.

Fritsch-Kinney offers only "agreed to value" yacht insurance policies, which translates to the amount provided for any and all damages incurred, except for sails, outboard motors, canvas covers, cushions or other specified items does not reflect depreciation or market values. Kinney says policy holders receive a greater settlement in the event of a claim because in a typical "actual cash value" policy, depreciation and market values are subtracted from the payoff you receive.

A yacht policy offers a deductible of up to three percent for any hull damage. However, deductibles for a total loss, marine electronics loss, or a windstorm loss vary depending on your specific policy. By contrast, a boat policy offers a flat deductible, typically of \$250, \$500 or \$1000.

The protection and indemnity (liability) feature of yacht insurance provides broad coverage especially designed to shield you from the effects of maritime law. Your coverage is much broader than with a typical watercraft liability policy, and offers protection to permissive users, captain and crew liabilities and the Jones Act, as well as salvage to a damaged yacht, legal liability to remove a sunken wreck and uninsured boater coverages. In a typical boat policy only general liability protection is included.

Another difference between most yacht and boat policies is that in yacht policies, your legal defense is in addition to protection and indemnity limits, while boats offer legal defense within the limit of liability.

Yacht policies have warranties including the sea worthiness, the navigation limits territories, and the navigation lay-up limits. Boat policies do not require warranties.

Example of Boat vs. Yacht Insurance Policy

What would your current boat or yacht insurance policy pay if you needed to collect from a claim? According to Kinney, "that depends on the quality of both your insurance company and the type of policy you have purchased."

The following are examples of policies insured for the same amount and with the same deductible by three different insurance companies. The claim is for both cosmetic and hull damage to a 1999 boat with a repair estimate of \$21,000. No other parties are held responsible for damages.

The difference between the amounts paid is based on the fine print of the policy. The bottom line is not the amount of your policy premium, but how much you will collect at the time of loss.

World Wide Boat Market Projected to Reach \$37.1 Billion by 2011

Research and Markets has released a pleasure boat market report, Opportunity Assessment for Composites in the Global Boating Industry 2006 – 2011, that projects the global demand for recreational boats – estimated to have reached \$23.8 billion in 2005 – will grow at a 7-percent annual rate, reaching \$37.1 billion in annual sales by 2011.

This report focuses on the pleasure boat market, including inboard boats, stern drive boats, outboard boats, sail boat and personal watercraft, and is intended to provide "a thorough strategic understanding of the development, trends and status of the global boat industry," according to the research firm.

"Given the size of the market and its prospects for further expansion, the recreational boat building industry represents a highly attractive opportunity for OEMs, material suppliers, engine suppliers and part suppliers," the company stated.

While North America represents the largest region in the world in total recreational boat production, its growth between 2000 and 2005 was only in the single digits, the study suggested. Europe saw the highest growth rate during the last 5 years as European-based boat makers were strategically more aggressive and subsequently increased their market share significantly as compared to 2000, the company stated.

The study ranks Brunswick as No. 1 in the global recreational boat market, followed by Genmar, Groupe Beneteau, Ferretti, and Azimut.
